### Building this Lego model was a Titanic undertaking!

Despite being expertly built at the Harland and Wolff shipyard in Belfast, the Titanic, considered by some at the time to be unsinkable, met its fate sinking in the North Atlantic Ocean on 15 April 1912 as a result of striking an iceberg. Surely if a ship, with a hull made from 2,000 single pieces of rolled steel plate and subdivided into 16 compartments that extended above the waterline, could be fatally damaged and subsequently destroyed by a single iceberg, a model made of Lego would stand no chance against 90 enthusiastic Year 2 children? Thankfully not – the impressive Lego model that our children were able to observe in detail survived its maiden voyage to Saint James Primary School!

In school we teach our children to be resilient, determined and persevere with their learning when it becomes difficult, therefore the 9,090 piece Titanic model was an excellent example of how perseverance can pay off. The model, which took 3 months to build, was kindly brought in by the dad and grandad of Marty in Poland class. The children were thrilled to see many of the features that they learned about at the Sea City Museum on a 1:200 scale model. The Turkish baths, the Grand Staircase, the enormous engines (19 metres long on the real ship) and the woefully inadequate provision of only 20 lifeboats were all present in miniature, and visible when the 135cm long model was split into sections. Thankfully the splitting of this ship was intentional and not, like the real liner, a result of the weight of water in the ship's stern putting immense stress and pressure on the ship's hull!

We would like to extend an enormous thank you to Marty's dad and grandad for bringing in the impressive model and for answering the many inquisitive and probing questions of our Year 2 Titanic enthusiasts!
