By the time Thursday arrived, we were welcoming anyone into our school: from the BFG to Harry Potter, Gangsta Granny to Dog man, all came to celebrate in World Book Day with us! It was a pleasure to walk around the school and watch the children sharing and immersed in books. However, we do hope it wasn't too disconcerting to be faced with a friendly crocodile, a racing driver or a Mr Men character (to name but a few) if you attended Parents' Evening on Thursday!

It might seem like a long week, but Year 3 appear to have started it in 75 AD!

The children in Year 3 must have been extremely puzzled on Tuesday. Why was it that, when they were supposed to be visiting the site of a Roman villa, the coach turned into, what appeared to be, a 1960s housing estate? However, their perplexed faces were short-lived as it soon became apparent that the historic site was situated in the middle of these far more modern houses.

We are truly fortunate that Fishbourne Roman Palace, the largest known Roman residence north of the Alps, is a mere 30 miles away and a short journey down the M27. Although no longer standing, like a contemporary palace, the children were amazed at how beautifully preserved some of the features were, especially some of the ornate mosaics. This was all the more remarkably when they heard that it dated from 75 AD (75 years after the birth of Jesus) and only 30 years after the Roman conquest of Britain!

The children learned that the desire for home improvements and updates is not a modern concept, as the Romans made extensive alterations to Fishbourne Palace over time. In fact, alterations were in progress in 270 AD when the palace burned down and was eventually abandoned.

As well as being transported back nearly 2000 years by just being on the site, the children participated in a number of activities that the Roman residents would have. With the exception of a couple of lucky children who had the opportunity to dress like the owners of such a significant residence, the rest of the children got to dress as slaves and attempt some of the tasks that would have been required of them. This included writing on tablets (not ipads, but some made from wax that were used frequently during Roman times) and cleaning the kitchen (a useful fact to know, considering it is Mothers' Day this weekend)! As well as inscribing on waxen tablets, the children tried their hand at mosaic-making (the palace included as many as 50 excellent mosaic floors as well as under-floor central heating and an integral bathhouse).

For the duration of this fascinating and revealing day, the children's behaviour was a credit to Saint James Primary School. Other visitors even commended the Year 3 staff on this. We're sure the children enjoyed learning about life in Roman times, although we're convinced very few would swap places with a Roman slave!





Our Year 2 Titanic trip was certainly no disaster

As many of you are undoubtedly aware, the city of Southampton and its people share many links with the RMS Titanic and her ill-fated maiden voyage. However, there is also one specific act of heroism related to the devastating maritime disaster that links it explicitly to West End. Captain Rostron of the RMS Carpathia risked his crew, cargo and ship as he raced through ice-fields to rescue survivors of the tragic ship. Whilst it is difficult to find positives in a disaster that claimed the lives of 1517 men, women and children, this total would be even higher if the crew of the Carpathia hadn't been able to pluck 705 souls from the freezing waters of the North Atlantic ocean. Rostron was a resident of West End up to his death in 1940 and is buried in the churchyard of St James church.

With this meaningful link in mind, the Year 2 pupils began their, rather eventful, journey to the Sea City Museum on Thursday 21st February. Whilst their journey didn't suffer an untimely end at the hands of a sizable iceberg, it was impacted by the closure of the M27 and the resulting traffic chaos. Upon their arrival (thankfully not too long after the museum opened at 10am) the children dropped their bags in the Grand Hall, before beginning their journey of discovery.

Although they may have already been aware of the main protagonists in the Titanic disaster, such as Captain Smith and Captain Rostron, the events that occurred leading up to the fateful night on April 15th 1912 were brought to life through the hidden stories of less well-known individuals on board. These contrasting accounts varied between passengers in different classes, as well as crew members of different rank and position.

Following on from their immersion in the varied experiences of travellers on RMS Titanic, the children had the opportunity to enhance their learning through dressing up in period costumes and engaging in hands-on activities that would have been performed on board.

Whilst others were investigating the museum, the children took turns to visit workshops to help them understand what the historic ship was like and why it met such an unfortunate fate. This included conducting scientific experiments to investigate the reason for the sinking, even with the different watertight compartments and bulkheads. They also had the opportunity to experience a number of fragrances designed to replicate the smells of different areas of the Titanic including the boiler room and first-class dining room.

After a busy morning, it was time for lunch. Although the delicacies offered for lunch on the Titanic's final day; Fillets of Brill, Egg a l'Argenteuil, potted shrimps, soused herrings and apple meringue (to name but a few) were not on offer, the children still heartily attacked their packed lunches.

The time after lunch was spent consolidating the morning's learning by exploring the exhibition and engaging with the interactive activities on display throughout the museum.

A fantastic day was enjoyed by all, and the children returned to school, with their learning about the Titanic enriched through the day's experiences. We were extremely impressed with the behaviour throughout the day and the museum guides even commented to teachers what a delightful group they were to work with. Well done Year 2!
