Genesis 1

Year 1 learn about fractions by making pizzas – how do you top that?

To enter *The Great British Bake Off*, contestants must be at least 16 years old. In addition, they cannot be professional bakers or chefs, nor can they have earned a living primarily from commercial baking. However, *Junior Bake Off*, a spin-off for younger bakers, accepts applicants between the ages of 9 and 15. When considering that, you might reasonably think that our Year 1 children will have to wait a few years before they can demonstrate their culinary skills and artistry. Not so.

After building structures that wouldn't be out of place on *Grand Designs*, that were featured in last week's newsletter, the children in Year 1 were again worthy of a place on another of TV's most popular reality shows, as they participated in a Saint James version of *The Great British Bake Off*!

With one of our Year 1 classes being Italy class, it seemed wholly appropriate that the focus of this 'episode' was Pizza week, with the children asked to arrange specified amounts of given toppings into quarters on their pizza. With careful consideration (and a few debates over the merits of pineapple on pizzas), they added toppings to each quarter of the (play)dough to explore the concept of fractions!

As well as showing some excellent mastery of Maths, the children also demonstrated an artistic flair, as they produced pizzas worthy (in appearance, at least) of the finest pizzerias! With such impressive creations, only the very best judges would have been able to determine a winner. Thankfully, we had those in the shape of Mary Berry and Paul Hollywood. Ignoring the fact that Mary Berry had turned back the decades, looking remarkably like Nicky our head chef, and Paul Hollywood looked eminently more handsome (isn't editorial control a wonderful thing!!), the children were impressed to have such esteemed judges present! Even with such an experienced panel, it was difficult to separate our terrific bakers and their magnificent creations. In the history of *Bake off*, we have seldom seen so many 'Hollywood handshakes' given in the space of such a short time!

As we mentioned previously, we are now certain that our amazing Year 1 pupils could easily star on *Grand Designs* for their wolf-proof dens and *The Great British Bake off* for their pizzas. However, judging by their versatility and all-round performance, we think the most appropriate show would definitely be *Britain's* (or at least Saint James') *Got Talent*!





With a tinge of sadness, we're bidding a fond farewell

Hindsight is a wonderful thing. Looking back over the past 30 years we can see the monumental events and decisions that have shaped history and marvel at how the impact of these cannot have been fully appreciated at the time. We can look back to 2019, when the first known case of COVID-19 was reported in Wuhan, China, and consider that there was no way of predicting the devastation this disease would inflict across the world. However, we would prefer to reflect upon the positive events and their consequent impact, as we head back in reverse chronology.

So, why are we recalling some of the most influential events of the past thirty years? Because, we already know the two most influential events from over 30 years ago (for Saint James Primary School, at least).

In 1987 and 1992, during rounds of interviews at Saint James Primary School, two fresh-faced young teachers secured teaching positions at our school. Despite their enthusiasm and obvious talent, like the aforementioned historical events, no one could have imagined they would still be making a positive impact on the lives of our children over thirty years later!

Arriving in 1987 and 1992 respectively, Jayne Ife and Debbie Schools joined our teaching team before many of the current crop of teachers were born (sorry Debbie and Jayne)! Indeed, they have even helped shape the career of others, with their former pupils, Assistant headteacher, Mrs Boyd and, Year 2 leader, Miss Thomas currently teaching at Saint James Primary School and former pupils Mrs Vicky Williams and Miss Donovan working in our office. Previous members of teaching staff at Saint James; Miss Hannah Williams, Miss Freya Williams and Miss Houghton were also their former pupils! Quite a legacy!

In the past few years, Mrs Schools has shared a class in Year 1 with Mrs Burgess before, more recently, covering for Mrs Hobbs' leadership time in Year R. Mrs Ife, after retiring from her position as class teacher 10 years ago, has continued to support the children of Saint James as a Learning Support Assistant and Speech and Language teacher. It is difficult to comprehend how many children these two fabulous and dedicated members of staff have supported over the last thirty-three years!

Whilst it is with sadness that we wave goodbye to Miss Schools and Mrs Ife at the end of term, we concede that they are probably well-deserving of their retirement! Their contribution to Saint James Primary School has been immense and their presence will be sadly missed. We wish them both all the best for the future

As well as saying 'goodbye' to, perhaps, the member of staff with the most appropriate name for a teacher, Miss Schools, we will also be bidding a fond farewell to the staff member with the least appropriate name; Mrs Moody! Adored by the children, especially those in Year 2. Nikki Moody is the complete antithesis to her inappropriate surname! Never without a smile on her face, Mrs Moody has ably supported our children over the past 4 years, after joining us in 2021.

As well supporting in the classroom, mostly in Year 2, Mrs Moody has also made a lasting impression on children across the whole school whilst in her role as a lunchtime supervisor. For those children who haven't had the opportunity to interact with Mrs Moody outside of the dining hall, we need to enlighten you. She is not afflicted with an unfortunate medical condition that has turned her hand red and swollen it to many times, its normal size: the hand is in fact foam and she wears it for the sole purpose of guiding children to their seat at the dining table!

Mrs Moody will be leaving us to work with her husband in their family business. We would like to say a big 'thank you' for all her hard work and dedication over the past four years.

When Kerri Ward started at Saint James in 2021, it was in the wake of the global pandemic. It is no secret that the period after the national lockdown was one of the most challenging for children and families in recent years. Therefore, the role that Mrs Ward made her own, that of Family Support Worker, had never been more important. Throughout the past 4 years, Kerri has supported many Saint James families, either directly, through workshops (such as the excellent parenting workshop she has run with Miss Bannister) or through signposting to external agencies and sources of support. We're sure that all the families that Mrs Ward has supported during the past four years, would

concur what an excellent job she has done. A qualified Social Worker, Kerri will be leaving us to start a role working for Hampshire Children's Services. On behalf of all the families of Saint James, we would like to extend an enormous 'thank you' to Mrs Ward for her hard work and commitment over the past four years.





Spectacular soccer success for Saint James seven

Climate Change Art project - the exhibition is open

As you know, from previous newsletters, our children completed some excellent 3D installations, based on the theme of small worlds and climate justice, to be displayed at Winchester gallery. A number of the beautiful orbs, containing a myriad of different creatures sculpted from recycled plastic, were sent to the gallery with the rest being displayed in the 'Outdoor Cathedral', in our environmental area.

Winchester gallery, so thrilled with our contribution to their exhibition, have emailed us some photos to document the progress of their installation. Although, when sent the exhibition was yet to be completed, at the time of publication the exhibition has been open for a day.

Taking over 3 weeks of painstaking preparation, the globes were laid on the floor of the gallery and sorted by size, material and colour. They were then attached to cotton or linen thread (which will be composted after the exhibition) to prepare them for hanging. Finally, the beautifully decorated spheres were hung at different heights until the space was filled.

When the children completed their SATs in May, we wanted to celebrate their achievement and attitude without it being coloured by the results achieved. Regardless of the percentages achieved and comparisons to national data, all of our children did spectacularly well. However, now the results have been published, we are pleased to report that all of their hard work and dedication has paid off. We are beholden of an impressive set of results that shows a marked improvement from last year, in a number of areas. They are also above the national average level of achievement in a number of areas. In particular, we are pleased with the significant increase in the amount of children obtaining a 'Greater Depth' level of understanding.

We would like to echo the sentiments that we shared in the week after the children completed their testing: a huge 'well done!' The children and staff in Year 6 should be very proud.

Battle of the Books - the final round of the year!

The Olympic and Paralympic Games occur every 4 years, with athletes preparing fastidiously in the build-up, to maximise their opportunities for success. The FIFA World cup also happens every 4 years raising levels of anticipation to a frenzy among players and fans alike, as they dream of their team lifting the famous trophy made of solid, eighteen-karat gold.

Whilst at Saint James Primary School, we are unable to offer a 37cm high, solid gold trophy as a prize, we are able to offer a hotly competitive contest that happens with a much more frequent regularity: The Battle of the Books!

Chris Tarrant on 'Who wants to be a millionaire', Anne Robinson on 'The Weakest link' and Bradley Walsh on 'The Chase'; all presenters who have become synonymous with the quiz they host or have hosted. We feel the same is now true of Miss Achilles! Hosting the fabled, forty- bookfocussed quiz, the children have become accustomed to what to expect from their charismatic host! As they entered the hall, ready to challenge their peers in other classes for the coveted title of winner of 'Battle of the Bands', you could sense the children bristle with excitement at the prospect of winning.

Now in its third chapter of the year, the children were highly motivated to maintain their winning streak, or snatch the title for the end of the year. Whilst many of the battles between classes was close, none were more fraught with excitement than the contest in Year 4. With each class attaining the perfect '10' score, it was impossible to separate them over the ten questions! Amazingly, the contest was the highest scoring 'Battle of the Books' of all time! With all the scores totalled and checked we are proud to announce our winners for Key Stage 1 and 2. Taking the accolade of top class in Key Stage 1 was Portugal class, whereas (as mentioned already) the winners of the Key Stage 2 contest were Sweden, Norway and Finland classes – all in Year 4.

So, if we were comparing 'The Battle of the Books' to a TV quiz, we've reached the end of series two, episode three, with a third series already commissioned and hotly anticipated! We even had a new theme tune, carefully crafted by Mr Jones and Miss Achilles (with a little support from AI) set to a fast-paced hip hop beat! We look forward to seeing how the children fare with a new set of '40 must-reads', as they enter their new year groups! We would like to extend a big 'thank you' to Miss Achilles for all the organisation and enthusiasm she has put into making 'The Battle of the Books' such a success!
