From fire grates to slates: our Year 4 children enjoy a day learning lessons from the past in a Victorian school room (rather than being sent up the chimney)!

With less than a month until Christmas day, many of you may have thought you'd been transported into Charles Dickens' 'A Christmas Carol' when you arrived at school on Wednesday. Whereas only a few weeks ago a time portal seemed to have opened in the Camino building, instantly transporting anyone entering the Year 5 classrooms back to the trenches of the Somme, the portal transferred to Year 4 this Wednesday. Crossing the threshold of any of the Year 4 classrooms made 150 years of history disappear in the blink of an eye, as the children were met by desks in rows and stern, primly-dressed adults who, despite their austere appearance, looked strangely familiar.

We know that Saint James Primary School was founded in 1903 (two years after the death of Queen Victoria) and that it was preceded by a 'national' school founded in 1838. However, during this period the school wasn't housed in our present building (the previous Victorian building is now named the 'Hilldene Centre' and is still in regular use). Therefore, the many suffragettes, chimney sweeps and scullery maids who took a seat in one of the ruler straight rows in the classroom were not a vision from the past, so who were they? They were our current Year 4 pupils enthusiastically participating in Victorian Day!

The children visited the site of South Stoneham workhouse last week, now the imposing and impressive apartment block at the heart of the housing development on Botley Road, and judging by the impressively authentic costumes, it appears that a few of them were inspired to dress as one of the residents.

With activities ranging from Mental Arithmetic to Penmanship, the children began to experience life for children who were fortunate enough to have a place in school, rather than a place behind a loom in a mill, in the workhouse or sweeping chimneys. So they didn't overlook these alternate experiences to an education, the children also replicated a working loom in the classroom by completing paper weaving. However, one glance at the smiles in the photos taken indicate that the conditions were a little too easy to be a true representation! This could probably be anticipated due to children as young as 4 years old being tasked with working up to 14 hours a day in a cotton mill. Victorian children were exposed to brutal discipline if they made mistakes, were late for work or, through sheer exhaustion, were caught falling asleep at their machines. Tragically, many children lost their lives undertaking dangerous tasks, such as cleaning under moving machinery. Mercifully, children at Saint James Primary School have no such worries!












As well as mastering pen skills to rival those of any experienced calligrapher, the children also became apprentice architects in the afternoon in designing their own workhouse and considering the use of different rooms.

There were only thirteen years from the end of the Victorian period until the outbreak of World War 1, a conflict that saw the participation of over 5 million British troops before it ended in 1918. After participating in a session of drill for their P.E session during the day, it is clear to see how men were prepared for this devastating war from their days at school. Under the instruction of Mr Walsh, who directed the children with the authority and severity of an army sergeant, the children performed a variety of drills that saw them stood with erect bodies, heels placed together and feet turned out at 60°. Unknowingly, this would have prepared children for the army parade ground and marching in unison.

Although the clothing worn by the staff in Year 4 made them difficult to recognise, it was their enthusiasm for getting 'in role' which made them almost indistinguishable. Barking out orders all day and being insistent on the behaviours and cleanliness of their respective classes made the children wary about their usually friendly and enthusiastic teachers and support staff. Thankfully the twinkle in their eye provided enough reassurance that it was only role play!

On behalf of the children in Year 4, we would like to extend a huge 'thank you' to all the teachers and support staff in the year group for making the day such an enriching experience. However, we would also like to offer a plea on their behalf; 'please don't treat us like that on other days of the year!'















Children in Need - Challenge 25

As well as dressing 'sporty or spotty' for *Children in Need* last Friday, the children were challenged to complete 25 of 'something' for the *Challenge 25 Children in Need* initiative. Some classes choses to complete 25 minutes of sporting activities, whilst others chose 25 quiz questions, spellings or times tables.

However, our perceptive Year 6 staff and pupils recalled that we have 25 orienteering posts strategically placed around the school site. Surely, this would be too much of a coincidence and opportunity to miss? Changing their shoes out of their smartest footwear, the children in Year 6 then spent a fun afternoon navigating their way around the Saint James grounds to locate all 25 points.

As they squelched through the muddy field to reach the furthest posts, the laughter that could be heard was evidence that the activity was proving to be both active and fun, whilst raising awareness for Children in Need. However, there was one certainty at the end of the activity, our Year 6 *Children* were *in Need* of a shower!

We are proud to share that the pupils and staff at Saint James Primary School raised in excess of £360 for Children in Need!



Let them eat cake

The quote 'Let them eat cake', is often attributed to the French Queen, Marie Antionette, to show how out of touch she was with the French people when she heard they had no bread to eat. This 'disconnect' with the French people was the catalyst for her head to be 'disconnected', as she met her fate at the guillotine. However, should France's most notorious queen have made that comment to the staff at Saint James Primary School, it would have been far better received! Their love of cake has proved to be instrumental in driving a monumental fundraising effort over the past two weeks!

Daisy's Bake Sale

Two weeks ago we told you of Daisy, in Year 3, and her intention to raise money for our two sponsored children from Rwanda by selling cakes to Saint James staff. Daisy set herself the target of raising £64, which would fund both children for an entire month, quite an impressive and ambitious target considering she intended to do all the baking herself (with support from her sister and mum). Whilst we know that it wouldn't take extensive market research to work out that teachers and support staff like cake, it would have been difficult to predict just how much! After plying her wares in the staffroom on Monday, Daisy raised an astonishing £147, more than double her target! Even with targeting an audience with a fondness for cake, that is an impressive total and needs to be attributed to Daisy's excellent baking and delicious cakes! If applications open for a new series of *Junior Bake-off* we strongly suggest that she considers applying. Maybe then she could bring in any practise attempts to test on staff!
