
The week ahead @ Saint James

Over the past seven years, we have regularly extolled the many qualities of our current Year 6 cohort. You might then consider it inevitable that we are a little biased when it comes this very special group of children. However, when reading a message like that, completely unprompted and from a member of the public that has taken the trouble to find the name and contact details for the headteacher, it is evident that others recognise it too!

The Leavers' service, at Winchester Cathedral, is an annual event for Year 6 children in every church school in the Winchester diocese. Always an enjoyable and emotive event, it gives our children opportunity to mix with pupils from other schools who are due to make the transition to secondary school.

During the course of the day, the children participated in a number of engaging activities led by cathedral and diocese staff. However, the impressiveness of the building itself was one of the most impactful memories of the visit. As they entered the cathedral, many children were overcome with awe and wonder at the scale of the wonderful old building. This was compounded as the children completed a planned treasure hunt of the cathedral, looking for significant artefacts and locations, whilst learning about its history.

After learning that many pilgrims to this wonderful, historic building knelt as they traversed a set of stone steps within the confines of the cathedral, many of our children dropped to their knees to replicate the actions of pilgrims throughout the years. It was certainly an impromptu and very special moment.

In addition to a treasure-hunt activity, the children took part in several other engaging activities such as a topical quiz and Ouisi games (the opportunity to connect and share creative moments with their friends).

Before the Leavers' event each year, there is always an art project for the children across the diocese to complete, so it can be displayed prominently in the cathedral ready for the service. Previously it has included compositions as diverse as decorating a chair and a sheep! Although this year was perhaps less obscure, it was certainly just as impactful. The project, entitled 'TriWonder', saw hundreds of beautifully illustrated animals, birds and insects attached to long lengths of string and suspended from the ceiling.

The project, named 'TriWonder' due to the amalgamation of two words; trinity and wonder was designed to help our children understand themselves as individuals and members of communities. It also aimed to capture the fact that we are part of three

significant elements : Sea, Land and Sky. Furthermore, Tri is significant in terms of distance. In the UK, regardless of whether we live in a rural, urban or city setting, we are never more than three metres away from animals, birds or insects.

The idea of Wonder is something we routinely promote, and give opportunity for, through Collective Worship: sensing awe and beauty, and pondering beyond our immediate experience and knowledge. TriWonder is therefore a mixture of both.

We've included some photos to accompany this text, so you can see how impress the installation was, when all the schools' contributions were placed together.

With a recent visit to Paulton's Park, the play, the visit to the cathedral and still leavers' events to go, our wonderful Year 6 children are definitely leaving Saint James on a high, with memories to cherish.

After three 'outstanding' performances; the curtain falls on 'An Inspector Calls'.

We've often said that the best acting you'll find is not in London's West End and theatre district but rather Hampshire's West End and Saint James Primary School. Never could this statement be more true than over the past few days, as the Year 6 children have indulged us in their performance of 'An Inspector Calls'. Those who turned up expecting to see the morality play of the same name, written by J.B. Priestley and often part of the GCSE syllabus, were certainly in for a pleasant surprise. Instead, they were given a glimpse into, what appeared to be, a mockumentary set at Saint James Primary School at the time of an OFSTED inspection!

We think that it is an appropriate time to share the disclaimer that; 'Names, characters, places and incidents are entirely fictitious and any resemblance to actual events or persons, living or dead, is entirely coincidental!' Now we feel more comfortable with providing a synopsis of the events and the actions of familiar-named characters, in the one-hour spectacular!

Beginning in the confines of the staffroom at Saint James Primary School, the teachers are summoned to an emergency staff meeting. Although fears that the impromptu meeting is to discuss the recent Year 2 trip to a chocolate factory, when all 'freebies' were eaten on the bus home leading to multiple, violent bouts of travel-sickness, the reality was much worse! An impending OFSTED inspection!

Mrs Marsh, uncharacteristically flustered, delivers the news that, although it is the last week of the Summer term and lots of end-of-year activities have been planned, the school is to receive a visit from the inspectors....tomorrow!

Anyone familiar with working in a school, will probably recognise the reality of taking down displays in the final week of the year, in preparation of a 'deep' clean over the Summer holidays. They will therefore empathise with the panicked teachers who delegate repurposing an old display in the hall to a group of less-than-enthusiastic pupils! As they sift through the tatty, torn and smudged pictures and pieces of writing that once made up a display entitled 'The Ancient Greeks', the children wonder how they can re-use it all to make something presentable. And does it actually matter that the 'R' is missing from the selection of letters forming the topic title?

The next day, with the children gathered in the hall for Collective Worship, Mrs Marsh tries to bring some calm to the room. However, as the anxiety reaches crescendo, the three inspectors enter! When the pupils and staff finally fall silent, the lead inspector, Mr Sourbottom, introduces himself and his two colleagues. They give shallow, insincere assurances that their visit is 'nothing to worry about' before beginning their inspection. Though anxious, everyone in school is determined that nothing will go wrong over the next two days and that the inspectors will see Saint James Primary school at its best!

Whilst the impressive OFSTED inspection of last May was truly something to be proud of, we concede that the fictitious events of 'An Inspector Calls', lend themselves more to an

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entertaining dramatic performance. Therefore, somewhat inevitably, things start to go wrong.

In the first lesson observed, an English lesson taught by Miss Elliott, the unfortunate teacher decides to try and impress the inspectors with her teaching by recycling a successful lesson from last term! Her dangerous assumption that her class will answer the questions with confidence and produce work of a high standard is fateful, as the class can't remember anything they've done before! (cue the song 'In One Ear, Out The Other')

The annual staff versus children rounders match, usually a good-natured event, also proves to be the cause of some concern for the inspectors. Their suspicions are raised when it appears that one member of staff seems to be doing all he can to ensure his team loses the game! Then there's the Summer fete; the culmination of tireless efforts by the SJSA to bring the school community together! Not even large quantities of candy floss can distract the inspectors from the fact that there seems to be quite a long queue at the St John's Ambulance tent!

Unlike 2024's real inspection, as their visit draws to an end, in the light of these 'incidents', it seems the inspectors' impression of Saint James Primary School might not be a positive one. However, the discovery of a mysterious envelope and its contents soon convinces Mr Sourbottom and his team that there are much more important things on which to judge a school, (finally, a touch of reality to the eminently enjoyable play)! The contents include a plethora of memories spanning the children's time at the school and the sight of our fabulous Year 6 pupils, passing images of these from person to person as they sang the performance's most emotive song, brought tears to many eyes.

After such a polished performance, it would be nearly impossible to draw-up a list for best actor and supporting actor. However, we would not be surprised to see some of our talented young performers accepting an Oscar, BAFTA or Golden Globe in the not-too-distant future.

Although we have stressed that the events of the play and characters' actions are purely fictitious, we imagine that many of the teachers must have been instrumental in the casting. A lot of the choices of actors must have been as popular with the Saint James staff, as when the casting director told the real-life Erin Brockovich she was going to played by Julia Roberts!

There are many so-called-reality TV shows where (allegedly) the producers don't let the truth get in the way of an entertaining story. On this occasion, we would like to reassure you that our Year 6 play firmly fits into this category. However the key, underlying, message is definitely pertinent: during their time at Saint James, the children have formed some delightful, long-lasting memories and wonderful friendships that will stay with them for a very long time.



Terrific Times tables success

It seems appropriate, in a week where we've looked at the bible story 'Seventy times Seven' during Collective Worship, that we have received the results of our Year 4 National Multiplication Check! A few weeks ago, we told you how proud we were of our Year 4 pupils who showed resilience and determination when approaching the National Multiplication Check. We wanted to extend our congratulations at the time, and clarify that our admiration was of their effort and not the score they obtained. However, historically, Saint James have always performed well in the test, which is completed by all Year 4 pupils across the country.

Whilst many of us might think that we are good at times tables, when the expectation is that we answer 25 questions, with only six seconds to respond to each one, in a completely random order, it then becomes a bit trickier. Couple that with the expectation of typing and submitting your answer on a laptop or tablet and the pressure becomes even more. Therefore, we were thrilled to discover that an amazing 40% of our Year 4 pupils managed to get every question correct. Amazingly, that is double the result achieved nationally last year! When we consider the amount of children who scored either 23, 24 or 25 marks, that percentage rises to 56%. We are extremely proud of the efforts of our Year 4 pupils and staff!

Help needed from Global Citizens

At Saint James Primary School, we were proud to achieve our Global Neighbours accreditation and feel a duty to empower our children to be courageous advocates for justice. To do this effectively, we need to garner a greater insight into the issues that impact upon people in these countries. We also think that it's important that we view ourselves as part of the global community, respecting the differences of others regardless of race, religion or belief.

As you are undoubtedly aware, our classes are all named after different countries with each year group's classes grouped together as specific continents or regions of the world. During the first week of the Autumn term, we would like to give the children the opportunity to immerse themselves in the richness of their class country; learning about key things that make the country unique through enriching experiences. Although we can provide the children with basic facts and information about their country, there are many countries that staff haven't visited or experienced the culture and traditions.

It is with a very fond farewell that we will be saying 'goodbye' to three much-loved members of our Saint James 'family'. Mrs Schools and Mrs Ife have amassed an impressive 65 years of service to Saint James Primary School between them and Mrs Moody being adored by many in her four years with us.
